Impact of Sports Funding 2015-2016

£2,848 was transferred over from last year's funding.

Sports funding for 2015-2016 has been spent on a variety of different things.

• Swimming - £4,394

Part of the Sports funding has been spent on subsidising swimming for other year groups. It was suggested in the past that more experience swimming would help increase the amount o children that are reaching the national expected level of 25m by year 6. As such Year 3 and 4 go swimming throughout the year and Yr 2 go swimming for the last term. Due to the change in swimming location the cost of swimming has greatly increased.

Unfortunately, from the information being received from the certificates the children are receiving, the extra swimming lessons are not having the impact that we had hoped for. Those that aren't able to swim have gained confidence but there still is a large proportion of children that are not going to reach the age expected level for competence in swimming. As such, next year the Sports premium money will not be used to subsidise the swimming lesson as we are unable to show that it has had an impact in the children's swimming competence.

Due to this we have arranged that next year the swimming will be organised differently. Yr 3, 4, 5 will be going swimming for a term with the opportunity for a Year 6 booster. As we have noticed that swimming has a negative impact on the attainment of the year 2's due to the proximity of the SATs and their immaturity.

 Ice Skating - - £1620 with support from the children – waiting for children contribution to be paid in.

Some of the Sports Premium funding was used to help subsidise a Year 5 half term course of Ice skating lessons. Overall all children enjoyed the lessons and we were able to see improvement in confidence and gross motor skills. 2 of our children at the time were picked by the Ice stadium to receive further lessons because of the promise they showed.

We were also able to see an increase in attendance on these days with only a few children unable to join in.

• Outside Sports Providers. - £4560

Part of the Sports Premium money has been used to provide consistent sports providers across year groups. In the past there has been a worry that this resource has not been spread adequately across the different year groups and Key Stages. This year we have been conscious of moving the providers around the different year groups in order for all teachers to see quality first teaching in PE. All teachers have been told to use this time as CPD so they are able to watch and learn different techniques and strategies that they will be able to take on later.

The feedback in regards to the Sports providers has been exceptional with many of the teachers using the skills they see in one PE lesson to further the skills in the children in additional lessons. This has helped increase the enjoyment the children have for PE especially as it means we are able to offer a wider variety of PE lessons.

• After School clubs - Part of the cost of the OP

Sports Premium has allowed us to be able to offer a wider variety of after school PE clubs by providing an outside provider to oversee these sports. This has had a great effect on the children's attitude to sport. The clubs that we have been able to run through Sports Premium are;

- KS1 Multi sports:
- Urban Hockey;
- Quick cricket.

Next half term we will also be providing a further after school PE club.

Due to these clubs we have seen an increase in the amount of children wishing to attend. Every PE club that is announced is always oversubscribed with a long waiting list. We have seen a big increase of children wanting to attend more PE clubs and more re-attenders. This means we have had to be more careful of places ensuring that all children are able to get an opportunity as the popularity of these clubs increases.

The regular attendance of children to these after school clubs along with the observation of quality first teaching of the outside providers has increased the staff's confidence in providing extra- curricular activities. As a result we also have after school clubs run by our teaching staff, these include a boys and girls football team, a mixed netball team and a year 3 and 4 football team.

• Get smart package - Youth Sport Trust Level 1 - £650

With part of the premium we were able to sign on to a course to provide many different aspects to help with the sports of the school. The main impact of this has been the access to staff training. Both the phase leaders of KS1 and Foundation are due to attend a course in ensuring quality first teaching in PE to these specific age groups focusing on the expectations and how they can deliver that to the children. The course is being delivered practically in order for them to get the most out of their training.

Both the PE lead and the shadow PE lead will be attending a course on PE assessing without levels to network and share good practice. This will be to focus on

effective assessment and providing tools and techniques that can then be assimilated to the rest of the teaching body on their return through a staff meeting to be confirmed by the HT. – This course has now taken place and allowed the PE coordinators to have an action plan for assessing without levels and provided a ot of information in order support teachers planning of PE.

• Entry into Sports tournaments and transport.

We have used a portion of the sports funding to allow our teams to be entered into varying sports tournaments. We have the boys football tournament, the girls football tournament, the 5 a side netball tournament, the 7 aside netball tournament and the Year 2 gymnastic tournament. This has had a great impact on the moral of both the school and the teams. The girls football team were signed up for the tournament before we were able to access their ability and they weren't ready for the tournament however this was also our first year with a girls team. Next year the girls will be more aware of what is expected of them and will be encouraged to compete against other teams.

The sport premium has allowed us to enter more tournaments as it has meant we are able to get to more of the tournament by providing transport, at a discounted rate due to being part of the Youth Sport Trust Level 1.

The premium has also been able to pay for transport for the Sport's Ambassadors to get to their termly meetings. This is an initiative that is being run across the city and has helped increase the children's activity. Without these ambassadors being abl to go to the meetings they would be unable to find the information out and pass this on to the school body. As part of this they have been able to set challenges. They have found participation difficult outside of school so have come up with in school opportunities for the children to take part, for example Den building in the hall with the year 2's. The feedback from this session alone was extremely positive building relationships across the school and supporting motor skills and team building within the lower year groups. The Young Ambassadors are currently creating a Road to Rio project that they wish the whole school to take part in and are working on the logistics before they can pass this information on.

We currently still have £2,845 left from the 2015-2016 Academic year budget which has been reserved for further Outside Providers in Summer 2 and to restock PE equipment. The equipment it will be used on has come from a stock check of the current equipment and ongoing conversations with teaching staff and their individual phase needs.

Actions for next year

- Swimming has been taken into consideration as we are unable to show the impact and therefore is under review. The proposal is to stop swimming in Year 2 and allow year 3,4 and 5 to go swimming for a term with a booster in year 6 in Summer 2.
- We will be signing up for a trial assessment package at £75 for the year with the option of extending that if we feel it suits Robert Shaw.
- Sports files are being created in order to support the teaching of games across the year groups – this will also require a further audit of the PE equipment.
- A staff audit will be completed in the PE staff meeting in order to assess whether we can provide further activities both in school and after school.
