| 1284 | King Edward releases a charter stating Fairs are allowed in the city of Nottingham. |
| 1541 | First fair under the name of 'Goose Fair Day' in September. |
| 1646 | Goose Fair cancelled due to bubonic plague. |
| 1752 | Goose Fair moved to October and held for 8 days. |
| 1914- 1918 | Goose Fair cancelled due to WWI |
| 1928 | Goose Fair moved from Market Square to Forest Fields for safety and space reasons. |
| 1939- 1944 | Goose Fair cancelled due to WWII |

| Why | Goose fair began as a Goose trading event, as all of the Geese from Lincolnshire, Cambridgeshire and Norfolk were brought to sell in Nottingham by farmers. | |
| Where | Goose fair first was held at the Market Square, it was then moved to Forest Fields as the fair became too big for the space in Market Square. | |
| When | Goose Fair always begins in the first week in October. It originally began in September before it was moved in 1752. | |
| What | Goose Fair is an annual travelling funfair held at the Forest Fields Recreation ground. It is made up of many travelling fairs. | |
